RE: Online Safety During School Closure

During this school closure it is highly likely that your child will be online considerably more than normal, either learning online, playing games or using social media. It is therefore important to make sure they are safe online.

Social Media and Online Bullying

There will also be concerns about messaging between pupils, from both in school and from other schools. This means that there may be worries about online bullying or sharing of inappropriate pictures or videos. By inappropriate we mean anything that is not age appropriate, this could include but is not limited to pictures or videos containing violence, nudity, swearing, cruelty to animals or bullying messages.

In any circumstance where a parent is concerned, we encourage ALL parents and carers to report any online bullying or sharing of inappropriate material to the police, as do other schools during this time. If you feel that your child has received anything of this nature we encourage you to call 101. Similarly, if your child has been sending such material it could be that the police may call you about this situation. Please help us keep your children as safe as possible during this difficult time.
